WASHINGTON:

The Senate Judicial Subcommittee declared Friday after full investigation into seizure of the Montgomery Ward mail order plant in Chicago that President Roosevelt had not constitutional authority to take such action.

F-L-A-S-H- -- ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, ITALY:

The Eighth Army has captured the town of Roccasecca and Mount Cairo, it was announced Friday night. FIFTH ARMY troops have captured Cori. San Giovanni, in Liri Valley, has also been captured.

UNDATED:

Martin Hallensleben, military correspondent for the German news agency, reports tonight (Friday), "Field Marshall Kesselring has given orders to his troops to give way at main points of enemy's pressure. This decision was taken in face of sweeping might of massed enemy tanks. Tanks have been given the task of relling over German lines deep into their rear and cutting of German fighting men. They have been lined up mainly in the ar s of Cisterna and on a triangle formed the Melfa and Liri rivers. In the area of Cistorna the enemy has achi

The enemy is sparing neither sacrifice nor efforts to force a breakthrough, or breakthroughs, in the German system of strong-points. With every new hour more fresh forces are being hurried into the front, and the battle has increased in violence since yesterday.

At several weak points Kesselring has brought up strategie reserves, but has refrained from calling up the entire body of

his reserve strength.

The present frontline now runs from north of Anzio and Via Vellete to Aprilia and thence via Cisterna-Jezzo-Priverno, to the area north of Vallecorsa and here further to Pastena towards the estuary of Melfa and Liri and then up to the area of Roceasecea and Picdimonte, where it finally joins an old mountainous front from north of Cassino to the Adriatic."

A German newsagency despatch from Mussolini's headquarters said today that an allout offensive against partisan formations.

in northern and central Italy began today (Friday).

The German front line radio tonigh broadcast an "eve of battle" call to German anti-invasion forces on the Atlantic Wall stating "German soldiers must realize they are on the eve of the day that will decide the fate of Germany. Many of us will be killed but we face this knowledge calmly."

ALLIED H. DQUARTERS, MEDITERRANEAN:

An official MAAF statement issued today on the second anniversary of the signing of the Anglo-Soviet treaty tells the story of how the MAAF has helped the Russian armics by preventing Germans from enjoying a breathing space in the Balkans. stresses that RAF night fighters together with heavy bombers of the 15th Army Airforce has so disrupted Balkans communications that the Germans have had no chance to prepare for an expected new Russian drive across the Bucharest Plain. When the Russians slowed up their offensive in order to consolidate their gains and reestablish their supply lines the Germans had good prospect of being able to draw on their reserves in Central Europe and the Balkans for a desperate stand. In the race for time, the advantage lay with the Germans. Then beginning on April fourth, day and night bombers ranged over Balkan supply networks disrupting every route for German reinforcements. Rail centers in every Balkan capital were hit. Only one remaining supply artery for the Germans remains unchallenged - air transportation and this can deal with only a fraction of the requirements of - the southern Russian front. This limited capacity has been further reduced by pounding cargo airfields by Italy based bombers.

LONDON:

American fighter-bombers and Mosquitoes today attacked German at fields, railway targets and other objectives in Northern France. Vichy radio reported that Lyons, Chambery and other targets were bombed. "Vast fires", said the radio, were caused in the center of Lyons. In one suburb there were 300 injured and two thousand reported homeless."

ADVANCED ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NEW GUINEA:

After a five mile drive from the Tor River, American troops with tank and air support have reached the Jap airfield at Maufin Bay, in north Dutch New Guinea, said General MacArthur's Communique Friday.

At one point the advancing troops had to overcome fierce enemy opposition. The battle for this airfield has been costly to the Japs, while American casualties have been comparatively light.

Farther to the east, more Japanese have been killed or captur d in the Hollandia Aitape area, where the job of mopping up the scattered remnants is almost complete. To date, Jap easualties here total 220.

Southwest Pacific air forces again concentrated on the Geelvink Bay area. The communique reported that attacking planes struck two airdrenes there, destroying eleven enemy planes on the ground and damaging four others. Other destruction included a barge and three trucks. There was no enemy interception. The communique added that Sunday's raid on Kamili airdrene accounted for eight Jup parked planes and damaged eight more.

WASHINGTON:

Raiding deep into Japanese territory an American carrier task force sent planes roaring out over Marcus Island, only 1,2000 miles from Tokyo, then moved southeast 900 miles to the Japanese held Wake Islands and dropped 150 tons of bombs.

Many ammunition and supply dumps were destroyed in this operation.

JAMESTOWN, NEW YORK:

About twenty persons were burned or injured Thursday when an ellosion rocked the two story concrete building occupied by the Mallews Tire and Tread Company. The explosion also shatered windows in the entire company area.

LOS ANGELES:

The city's mayor and health officials descending in a surprise move on the "Little Tokyo" section of down town Los Angeles have posted a vacate and cleanup notices on many of the ramshackle dwellings now jammed with an estimated eightythousand workers, where thirtythousand Japanese lived before the war. More than fiftyseven honers were declared unfit for human habitation and were ordered vacated, while 135 other were ordered to be repaired.

WASHINGTON:

A tremendous shift in Army supply plans to heavy artillery and big gun ammunition was viewed in production quarters Thursday as evidence that the army may be laying plans for possibly long and costly inland fighting after invasion beachheads are secured. Official sources disclosed that new plant construction has been approved to meet the army's towering pre-invasion call for the big guns during "thunder over Europe."

.IASHINGTON:

To protect Allied ships from U-boats, the Navy has a "new weapon" - ROCKETS. This was disclosed Thursday by the Navy in the first announcement that rockets have been used to destroy German undersea raiders in the Atlantic.

U.S. PAC FLEET HQ., PEARL HARDOR:

Some lives were lost, a number of men injured, and several small vessels destroyed by an explosion and fire last Sunday while ammunition was being unloaded at Pearl Harbor, the Navy announced Thursday. The brief announcement said ammunition was being unloaded from one of a group of landing eraft moored together when the explosion occurred. A court of inquery headed by Admiral John Shafroth is investigating.

WASHINGTON:

CIO President Philip Murray said Thursday only an extreme emergency in mappower requirements would justify enactment of pending "work or fight" legislation and that no such an emergency now "xists. Murray in a statement submitted to the Benate Lilitary Affairs Committee added that it would be a tremendous mistake to retreat now and say we needed hitherto unnecessary compulsory labor.

LONDON:

LOS ANGELES:

Juit and counter suit is the newest refrain involving the star of "The Song of Bernadette." Twentieth Century Fox borrowed actress Jennifer Jones from Selznick, made Bernadette, and made her a star. Several weeks ago Twentieth Century Fox sued her for sixhundred thousand dollars asserting she failed to appear for work on a second picture under a borrowing agreement with Selznick which holds her contract. Selznick Jednesday sued Twentieth Century Fox for "declaratory relief" seeking to terminate the pact on the ground that a script for the purposed Twentieth Century Fox picture was not submitted to her.

LOS ANGELES:

Comedian Charles Chaplin Thursday formally alleged that the paternity suit pending against him was filed because he was reputed to be wealthy and his accusers believed the defendant would make a cash settlement rather than be compelled to stand trial. In an answer filed in superior court the actor denied generally and specifically each and every allegation that he was the father of the seven month old daughter of his one time protege, Joan Barry. He alleged that Joan Barry well knew and she now knows that the defendant herein Chaplin is not and could not be the father of said infant plaintiff but that never-the-less Miss Barry and her mother went ahead with the filing of the suit. Chaplin was acquitted in April of a Federal Mann Act indictment accusing him of taking hiss Barry to and from New York City with immoral intent.

SALT LAKE CITY:

United States District Judge Blake Kennedy, of Cheyenne, Wyoming, Thursday set for June seventh the sentencing of eight men and a woman convicted of violating the Federal White Slavery and kidnaping statutes through plural marriages. The nine persons, members of a fundamentalist cult which advocates plural marriages as a religious principle, were convicted by Judge Kennedy.

TULE LAKE, CALIFORNIA:

An internee of the Tule Lake segregation center was shot and wounded critically Vednesday by a military police sentry. Lt.Col. Verne Austin, commanding the project's military detachment, named a board of investigation. The segregation center houses persons of Japanese descent admittedly disloyal to the United States.

COLUMBUS, OHIO:

J. H. Cooper, 58 year old news commentator who each morning advised school children to be careful while crossing the streets, was injured seriously Vednesday in a traffic accident. He suffered a skull fracture when his automobile collided with another car.
