The Impact of a 72 Year Old Discovery

15 days ago my status and blog asked "Can I do it again?" as I described my chorale's upcoming 7 day singing tour of Canada. The answer - YES! Even though our schedule didn't allow time for SP beyond logging in to keep my streak alive, the residual "Spark Effect" was enough for me to return home without weight gain. More about that another time.

I returned home to find a package containing nearly 200 negatives from 1945, all from the WWII Cruiser the USS Philadelphia.

They were found in a suitcase in the attic of a man who died recently. They were sent to me by his son. He found me online because I created and maintain the website of the USS Philadelphia. (link at end)

The Philadelphia was my Dad's ship and I've written before about how in our travels I try to visit the places described in his war diary, walk in his footsteps and recreate the photos that he took.

Getting images from 72 year old negatives is quite a task, testing the limits of my technological/photo editing ability. So much of the time I would have spent on Spark is currently dedicated to restoring those pictures.

Why the hurry? It's been 72 years after all.

In 9 days the remaining crew of "The Philly" will hold their 54th reunion. I want to have this new discovery available for the men and their families, both attendees and those who are only connected virtually because they are not healthy/strong enough to travel. My father died in 1997, but I will continue to attend the reunions as long as the remaining sailors vote to continue "one more year"

Here's an example of the images I'm restoring. The note on this set of negatives was "Navy Day 1945" The ship had returned to Norfolk to be refitted as a troop carrier to bring the soldiers home from Europe and the ship was open to visitors

There were thousands of men who served on the Philadelphia during the war. How did he wind up front and center during a ceremony?

Dad told me that he didn't see the war as much as listened to it on an extreme lower deck wearing headphones during battles as part of his "Damage Control" duty.

After each battle it was his job to type the report for the Captain. Dad was a welder by trade but could also type 60 words per minute so he was assigned to the office.

This was a disappointment to him but the Navy had a lot more men who could weld than could type. He accompanied the Captain during inspections and typed those reports too as well as any daily addresses to be read over the ship's loudspeaker.

In retrospect I'm glad he wasn't assigned to the machine shop. You just never know how things will work out.


There aren't many WWII Veterans left and the ones who are still with us REALLY appreciate the interest taken in their lives. You are doing a wonderful thing for them.


