Friday, January 01, 2021

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This is the first time Times Square has been empty on New Year's Eve since celebrations began in 1907. The lights are out. The ball did not drop. There is a wartime blackout.



Fatigue is setting in. A dictator is still in charge of the continent.

London has endured the blitz. In the US, up until 1 year ago, the views of the "America First" organization were supported by a significant segment of society. Britain stood alone.

I've been watching a lot of WWII movies and documentaries, especially the ones made DURING the conflict. Stories about fighting on the front lines and life on the "home front." These were produced when they were uncertain of the outcome. Many focused on the question: "Will America now unite and pull together for the sake of the world as well as themselves?"

This time our enemy is invisible, but we hear the same attitude expressed. Fatigue is setting in. We've been going through this now for almost a year. I'm just so tired of all of this. I'm just gonna do whatever I want to do.

I bet after one year of fighting, our troops were also "so tired of all this." Those on the home front were tired too. Rationing, worrying about loved ones, women working outside the home, many for the first time at occupations formerly considered "men's work"

My Dad was a welder. He had a deferment because of his plant's war production. Then he enlisted. I wonder what his parents thought of their youngest son following his 3 older brothers into the military?

Dad joined the company in 1940. He was trained as a welder in a government NYA camp during the depression.

The arrow points to him in the cropped Christmas party picture from that year. I guess the new guys were the cooks.



The parties were held on the plant floor then. There was no party in December 1941. Sometimes events require postponement of tradition.

I wonder what the "Greatest Generation" would think of our "fatigue" today. We praise them for securing the freedom we have today.

I hope we will honor them by using it wisely.

My dad was also deferred. He took time off work to go for his physical. By the time he got there, his company had already notified them that he was critical to the war effort because he designed airplanes.

I always knew he wanted to be in the service because he said so. He had been in ROTC. It wasn't until 2 or 3 years ago, going through my mother's things, I found a letter from her brother stationed in the Pacific. It was dated 1945. He was very explicit in telling my mother to keep her husband at home with their 2 small children. He told about seeing war correspondent Ernie Pyle killed. I thought I felt the horror of war. Then 2 years ago I visited the National WWII Museum in New Orleans. The European side was civilized compared with the War in the Pacific. Going through the exhibits made it feel like I was there experiencing the jungles, the heat, and the horrors.
